BEST AVAILABLE SCIENCE NOT YET AVAILABLE FOR LOON LAKE MILFOIL

Over the last three years the Loon Lake Lake Management District under the direction of Stevens County has been working with the Washington State Department of Ecology following the guidelines of a Water Quality Aquatic Invasive Plant Funding Agreement (Grant). DOE's Overall Goal for this grant is **"To maximize efforts to identify and implement the most effective treatment for this new, hybrid strain of watermilfoil on Loon Lake and prevent its spread to other regional waterbodies."** Final Task #5 of our grant is a lake wide application with the suggested herbicide from grant Task #3 and 4.

It has been determined (from grant task 3 and 4) the Best Available Technology is a chemical called ProcellaCOR. Some of the benefits include, lower costs low volume use rates. No Swimming, fishing or human potable water restrictions. No turf irrigation restriction. This herbicide is a systemic product that is selective for Eurasian Milfoil and hybrid strains of aquatic weed. Reduced Risk herbicides are a new class of products recognized by EPA in February of 2018. The US EPA issued registration of ProcellaCOR the new reduced risk aquatic herbicide to this category because it has a better environmental profile than current registered products. It also has the fastest uptake time of any of the aquatic herbicides available which was also proven in our study, making it more effective in high water exchange environments. Applicators have been able to use this technology for over a year in other states. In addition, 1 or 2 pints of this product replaces between 200 and 400 pounds of 2,4D reducing the amount of herbicide needed.

Ecology felt however that the NPDES permit required an amendment. Initially, the Department was going to delay amending the permit until the next permit cycle some years in the future. After considerable public input to DOE, last summer agreed to move ahead with a permit amendment. The public comment period on this closed in December, over 4 months ago. This permit was promised to be available for use in May of 2019. We recently found out that because of priorities within the Department it will be delayed until July 5th of 2019 maybe longer. The original May approval would have allowed the LMD to complete the grant requirements and meet the June 30, 2019 deadline.

Stevens County Commissioner Wes McCart has been very proactive in his efforts to help resolve this bureaucratic delay by enlisting the support of our District 7 state legislators Shelly Short, Jacquelin Maycumber and Joel Kretz. Stevens Co. Commissioner's office has also completed and submitted a formal request to DOE to extend the deadline of our Water Quality Grant in the event the Best Available Science will not be available in time. At this printing no Loon Lake Milfoil herbicide application date has been determined.

WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROGRAM COMMENT ON STEVENS COUNTY SHORELINE MANAGEMENT PLAN UPDATE



LLPOA WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROGRAM

In 2006 the Loon Lake Property Owners Association, with technical help from the Washington State Department of Ecology, developed a water quality monitoring program for Loon Lake. Equipment for the program was purchased through a Washington State Hussian grant of \$10,000. Training of participants was done by the Washington State Departments of Ecology and Fish and Game. The program measures temperature, conductivity, Ph, dissolved oxygen, nutrient levels (phosphorus and nitrogen compounds), and water clarity in the water column. Forays are made three times per year at mid- June, end of July and mid-September by a volunteer team.

Results clearly show that Loon Lake is impaired. The lake's maximum depth is a little over 100 feet. Beginning with stratification in the Spring and lasting until Fall turnover there is insufficient (less than 4 milligrams per liter} dissolved oxygen below a depth of 50 feet to sustain aquatic life (other than bacterial). This impairment has existed throughout the life of the monitoring program and shows no significant change. This impairment has resulted in almost total loss of the Mackinaw fishery and significant depletion of the Kokanee fishery. The impairment, if allowed to continue or become more dire, it will result in continued pollution moving slowly toward the surface and increased loss of recreational and real value.

Stevens County's current proposal ignores this impairment in setting developmental standards. The proposed reduction by 25 to 50% of the standard shoreline buffer makes no attempt to control or mitigate lakeside development or redevelopment which will inevitably lead to additional lot coverage by impervious surfaces thereby increasing contamination by runoff to the lake. These proposed standard shoreline buffers are not supported by current, accurate and complete technical information and do not protect the lake. The County's proposal should either exempt Loon Lake from being affected by these impractical and extremely dangerous standards or a serious scientific study of the entire subject should be entertained with a view toward the establishment of a set of standards that protect ours and Stevens County's precious waters.

MORGAN WOOD FIRE REDUCTION & HEALTHY FOREST WORK UNDERWAY

In about 4-6 weeks, Morgan Wood will look a lot like Mackinaw Woods (across the highway from the new fire station) ...look and you'll have a glimpse into the beauty of a renewed and fire wise



forest for all of us to enjoy.

Work began the last week of April and should be complete near the middle of June. Selective cutting of "some" larger trees and the droughted and bark beetle killed dead trees will leave most of the larger, medium, and smaller healthy trees. When the work is done, Morgan Wood will have stronger, more resilient trees able to better push out future bark beetle infestations which can kill ALL the trees in an area and make fire danger a serious concern.

Over 75 donors in the Morgan Park and North Shore neighborhood have helped to make this work possible under the stewardship of the Loon Lake Land Conservancy, owners of this 40-acre parcel. These donors financially supported this work to protect our neighborhoods from fire while renewing a wonderful woodland used daily by numerous walkers, dog owners, cyclists, and others who enjoy the tranquility and beauty of this 40-acre parcel.

In addition to local donors, the Department of Natural Resources for the state of Washington is providing matching dollars and supervision to achieve this more fire wise forest by guiding the work using modern best forest practices:

- 1) ...trees need to be spaced approx. 14 feet apart at the crown to prevent fire from jumping across the tops of trees into our Loon Lake residential neighborhoods;
- 2) ...trees need to be pruned up about 12' from the ground to prevent fire from laddering up to the crown;
- 3) ...masticating/mulching of all the low limbs and brush will occur to provide more moisture retention for all remaining large, medium, and smaller trees to stave off drought;
- 4) ...some groupings of small trees and some dead snags will be left as wildlife shelters and habitat;

The Conservancy is choosing a stronger forest for the next many, many years...rather than a droughted, dead, dying forest, and huge fire hazard next to hundreds of our homes. Thanks again to all who have provided support and encouragement to get this work completed.

Last year the purchase of 390 feet of waterfront wetland and the 22 acres of woods behind it was announced by the Loon Lake Land Conservancy. This is a vital piece of remaining wetland which works to filter and cleanse lake water while its uplands filter hillside run-off into the lake. For all of us who love Loon Lake and want it to remain clean and useable for swimming, fishing, boating, and all our recreational use, protecting these and other wetlands and surrounding woodlands is critical to saving our lake from rapid deterioration, algae blooms, and unusable waters.



The property has already been professionally surveyed and corners marked. In the next many months, signage, entry work, trails work, and specific wetland boundary surveying and marking will occur. This will allow the public to responsibly use this important wetland for recreation and enjoyment into the distant future.

Key members of the Conservancy Board made significant donations and private loans to purchase this wetland initially when the opportunity arose. More than half of the purchase price has been covered thanks to their great generosity and vision.

Over the coming year, the remaining \$40,000 plus will need to be raised from our local Loon Lake community to retire the debt and complete this important preservation work for the future of our lake, each of us, and for our children and grandchildren. She was on her way home to Loon Lake.

2019 will be the 4th year of the Loon Lake / Deer Lake Property Owners Association combined efforts in organizing and maiming the local Chipper Day activities. The disposal fee is \$10 per load with a maximum of \$20 for truck and trailer. The proceeds for this event will support one of our local volunteer organization. It is our goal to have volunteers safely assist in unloading each vehicle or trailer as they arrive. The vacant lot is designed with an entrance and exit driveway to help with traffic flow. The Chipper Day site will only be open and available to accept debris on collection day during the hours of 9:00AM to 3:00PM absolutely no garbage, lumber, metal or plastic. The "Dock Demolition" has been an important activity that the LLPOA has provided for over twenty years. Conditions for its operation have changed dramatically over the years as burning is no longer acceptable. As a result, we must now pay for disposal of all materials. We have had a problem in the past of many docks being dropped off without being identified by the owner. Therefore, the owners are not paying the disposal fee and the project is losing money.

In order to address these new challenges, we are proposing that you register your dock for the demolition to help us in our planning process. The disposal fee will be \$4 per foot of the dock if you deliver it to the work area. (On Demo Day) We would also offer to pick dock up at your property for an additional charge of \$50 per dock. Payment must be made at the time of pickup.

Removing the old docks from the lake has been a priority for the LLPOA for many years with scores of volunteers helping with this process. This year the pyro-technician with upgraded equipment will be electronically firing the show from a nearby boat. His requirements are line of sight and he will maintain a safe 300 foot distant for him and the crew.

Cancellation of the Fireworks show is always possible as July weather conditions are sometimes unpredictable. Final decisions rest with Fire Dist. 1 Chief Bucy in this matter.

SPRING IS HERE AT LOON LAKE

Spring is finally here and it's time to put your boat back in the water. The success of your spring boat prep is directly related to the proper winterizing of your engine and marine systems. The better you did for your winter layup, the better your chances are for another great season of trouble-free boating.

It is also important to make also sure that you have the proper boating safety equipment, and in good condition. As I am a member of the US Coast Guard Auxiliary, I would be happy to perform a free, voluntary Vessel Safety Check (VSC), at my dock near Shore Acres Resort, to make sure that you have the proper equipment on-board in case of any emergency on the water.

My suggested spring boat commissioning checklist:

- Before launching your boat, make sure that you have securely installed the drain plug
- Inspect your propeller and outdrive for dings, pitting, cracks and distortion
- Fully charge your battery, and clean all terminals and cable ends
- Inspect the engine compartment, checking for any rodent or winter damage
- Check all fluid levels including engine oil, power steering, power trim reservoirs, and coolant
- Visually inspect all fuel lines for cracking and make sure they are flexible, and clamped
- Check all the control cables, their condition and operation, and the safety/kill switch
- Raise the outboard engine / outdrive to listen for any strange sounds from the trim/tilt system
- As you start your engine for the first time, there should be some smoke that clears from the exhaust from the fogging oil that winterized and coated the spark plugs
- Check for oil pressure if you have a dash gauge, and then look for water running from the exhaust or telltale; if you see none, stop the engine and recheck your hose connections
- Once water is flowing, run your engine just above an idle speed and check your dash gauges
- Check for any for fluid leaks around or under the engine
- Listen carefully for any strange engine noises such as loose belts or hoses
- Check the steering system for tightness or looseness
- Shift into forward, neutral and reverse and listen/feel for anything abnormal
- Test bilge pump and inspect the bilge area (if you have one) for any fluid leaks
- Check flares (expiration date) and fire extinguishers (charge), and replace/recharge as necessary
- Check your life jackets to ensure they are in good condition and that there are enough on board for all potential passengers
