



NATURE MANDALA *By Deanne Darlene Impecover*



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LOON LAKE LAKE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT (LMD) FOR HYBRID MILFOIL

Aquatechnex Inc. has been the Loon Lake LMD's vendor for controlling aquatic invasive Hybrid Milfoil on our lake since 2016. Fortunately, they are considered one of the essential service industries during the Covid 19 virus pandemic. Even though the Loon Lake Advisory Board members have been unable to meet publicly this 2020 season we have had the benefit of electronic meetings with our vendor to formulate plans for milfoil abatement. Aquatechnex is scheduled be on Loon Lake in early to mid-May to map and evaluate the success of the 2019 Hybrid Milfoil herbicide treatment. The growing season for most milfoil generally starts in late

May with early to mid-June as the most opportune time to treat as the plant is eagerly looking for nutrients and sunlight.. As you may recall Loon Lake became the first lake in the state to use a recent Washington State Department of Ecology approved herbicide ProcellaCOR. This product has been approved for use in potable water reservoirs and lakes with no restriction on the use of the water supply, has no restriction on the use of treated water on turfgrass, and has much shorter irrigation restrictions than many of the other products available. ProcellaCOR is a systemic, selective herbicide that can be used to target these invasive

species without impacting most native species. It also has the fastest rate of plant absorption of any of the currently registered aquatic herbicides—meaning it can be used effectively in very high-water exchange environments, including river systems, impacted by these plants. The LMD advisory committee will determine the best application date based on Aquatechnex findings following the May lake inspection. As is required, all Loon Lake property owners will receive a USPS notice of herbicide treatment dates as well as the beach front flyer notices prior to any treatment.

Uncertainty seems to be the word of the day in most aspects of lives. The Coronavirus has made difficult the mundane. What once was a normal activity is no longer within in our reach. The planning and organizing for the Loon Lake Property Owners July Firework program certainly falls into this realm of uncertainty. Our planning starts early in the year signing contracts with the fireworks vendor. They then organize their local shows with available pyro-technicians. It generally becomes clear what day near the 4th of July we can do the Loon Lake show. This is not the case in 2020. With new social distancing rules that may stay with us for a long while, it has created uncertainty in the market. Social gathering and firework shows are synonymous. The Loon Lake fireworks show, however, does not fall into the mass gathering scenario. We are totally private with our show lit from the middle of the lake. This is where the fireworks vendors crystal ball gets a little foggy. 1) The supplier's warehouse is in southern California and is currently following stay at home orders by the governor and uncertain when they can return to work. 2) The possibility exists all 4th of July shows will be cancelled by state government. 3) Vendor will prioritize shows with signed contracts. 4) In the event all shows are postponed contractually we have until October 2020 to do a show. (Not a good option for

our community). As it stands the Loon Lake show is scheduled for Friday, July 3rd. If we have the option for a July 4th show, we will take it. The social networking websites www.loonlaketime.com and www.loonlakepoa.org and Loon Lake Next door will post the latest updates or changes as they happen. The LLPOA would like to express our thanks to Barry and Mickie Smith who have kindly granted us the use of their personal 12'x40' dock to be used for the 2020 show. We are always on the search for other lake residents willing to provide a dock and host the set up. If you are interested in providing your dock and a beach front, please let us know. Viewing the show from a boat is becoming popular especially for those who have an obstructed view from their home. However, please use caution during the lighting. The request is to stay at least 300 feet from the dock during the show for your safety. This year the pyro-technician with upgraded equipment will be electronically firing the show from a nearby boat. His requirements are line of sight and he will maintain a safe 300 foot distance for him and the crew. Local cancellation of the Fireworks show is always possible as July weather conditions are sometimes unpredictable. Final decisions rest with Fire Dist. 1 Chief Bucy in this matter.

BOATING TIPS 2020*By Captain Stephan Reckie*

One of the things I have always enjoyed most about owning a boat is sharing it with friends and loved ones as passengers. Even as a motorcycle rider, I always made sure that my passengers understood the basics of riding and how to be the best passenger for our safety. I believe that it is important for a boat owner to share safety and courtesy tips with your passengers, just as an airline captain does on airplanes. I have pulled together some suggestions of topics that would be great to share with passengers before leaving the dock.

Respectful Rules of the "Road":

- Boaters pulling skiers, boarders, tubers, and surfers usually have the right of way, except over non-motorized vessels. You should always have a trusted passenger be a second lookout to let you know of any dangers or hazards.
- Don't follow another boat too closely that is towing a skier. If the skier wipes out, you need to allow yourself enough space and time to turn without running them over.
- Jet skis should not jump the wakes of boats, which is especially important when a boat is towing skiers or tubers
- When approaching a stopped boat, don't come too close, as there might be someone swimming or in the water alongside the boat.

Boat Operator Responsibilities:

- A distracted boat driver is not a safe and responsible boat driver.
- Know how to launch your boat off a ramp and how to back your trailer and load your boat safely, including all passengers and equipment, as most likely others are waiting in line to do the same.
- Make sure that you inform your passengers of the location of fire extinguishers, life jackets, a throwable cushion, and your first aid kit in case of a person overboard or any emergency.
- If possible, make sure that someone else can also operate the boat in case you fall overboard or get ill.
- You are responsible to make sure that children under 13 are always wearing Coast Guard-approved life jackets and that they are seated while underway.
- You are responsible for any damage or harm from your wake from your boat to the shore line, so slow down near the shore and keep your wake to a minimum.
- If you are towing or pulling a skier, as the operator you must keep watch on what is in front of you and designate a spotter to watch the skier or tuber. That spotter is also responsible for raising an orange flag if the person is in the water or not being towed. When you resume movement, the flag should be lowered to let others know that you are moving.
- Make sure that your boat doesn't pollute and that your passengers don't litter.
- Fueling boats on the water requires extra precautions to avoid spillage, so please contact me for information on easy siphon hoses.
- Always pay attention and be a defensive boat operator.



Watersport Courtesies:

- Don't be a rope hog - always take turns with others that want to ride behind the boat.
- Cheer everyone on when they are trying something new for the first time, like wakeboarding, slalom skiing, or surfing. It's just as much fun watching someone challenge themselves. You will have a turn soon enough and will want to receive the same encouragement.
- Get involved and offer to help with spotting and managing the orange flag. Keep a lookout and let the driver know when a skier has fallen.



Passenger Courtesies:

- Passengers should take off their shoes when getting in the boat which helps keep the carpet and upholstery clean.
- If a passenger is a skilled boat driver, it is nice to offer to drive to give the boat owner a break.
- Smokers should be careful where their ashes fly when smoking as they can cause harm and a possible fire.
- Don't apply spray sunscreens while on board, as they can damage carpet and boat interiors.
- Offer to bring snacks and drinks, trying to bring snacks that are fairly "clean" to eat.
- After a fun-filled day of boating it is nice to offer to help load and wipe down the boat, organize gear, and remove trash. Even offer to come back another day to help give the boat a good cleaning, inside and out.
- Always be thankful! Boat owners love to share the boating experience with their friends and family, and they want you to have a good time. Most often they love a simple thank you in return, but keep in mind that running a boat does cost money, so gratitude is always appreciated by the owner.



Passenger Safety:

- Stay in your seat when the boat is moving and make sure that all children are seated as well, and not bow-riding.
- Always let the driver of a stopped boat know when you are getting in the water.

Having fun is a big reason for boating on a lake, and as a reminder, safe navigation and operation is the group responsibility of all boaters. To make sure that you have the proper equipment in good condition, the U.S. Coast Guard recommends that all recreational boaters, including personal watercraft and paddle sport users (kayaks, canoes, and paddleboards) take advantage of a free, voluntary Vessel Safety Check (VSC) every year. As the Lake Safety Educator on the LLPOA Board and a certified US Coast Guard Vessel Safety Examiner, it would be a pleasure to perform your VSC and/or answer any boating questions that you may have. Also, I plan to teach a half-day boating safety class in the local area, so if you are interested, please email me.

Have a great Spring and Summer Boating Season! I look forward to seeing you having fun safely on Loon Lake.

We reached a milestone at last year’s dock demolition. There were very few docks and it became apparent that even fewer people were willing to pay to have their docks demolished and the debris hauled away for legal burning by the state.

I am recommending to the board of directors at our next meeting that we schedule future dock demolitions based upon pre-registered and pre-

paid participants. We can select a preliminary date and time with the WDFW, schedule equipment and operators, and reserve the proper number of bins based upon the information that is provided prior to the cutoff date. If interest is not sufficient we can contact the participants and follow up with a rescheduled date in the fall to permit additional participation and utilization of the operators,

equipment, and bins. We all agree floating unclaimed docks are a hazard on the lake, but the current system seems to encourage derelict docks being set free to travel the lake, only to have the dock hauled to the demolition by a concerned neighbor. The docks were not certain to be cleared from the lake and the LLPOA was left with the costs.
