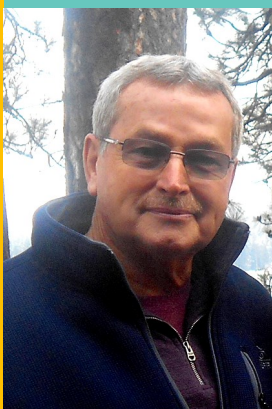

LOON LAKE MILFOIL TREATMENT 2020*By Lee Evans, Chairman Loon Lake LMD*

The Loon Lake Lake Management District (LMD) has been quite active this season with an early June survey followed up by a June 18th ProcellaCOR herbicide treatment of 10.2 acres. Phase 2 included a second survey and inspection on July 9th with a follow up ProcellaCOR treatment of 22.5 acres on July 15th. A third survey and inspection in August with a third application of 22.2 acres (Phase 3) was on September 3rd for milfoil located in the deeper areas of the lake.

The Phase 1 early June activity was twofold. To inspect the effectiveness of the one-year post treatment results for DOE grant final report and target the earliest new milfoil growth. Phase 2 survey was to identify areas missed or that had not been visible in the June survey. Phase 3 will concentrate on the milfoil located in the deeper waters that are more difficult for liquid herbicides to be effective. Herbicide efficacy in aquatic environments is influenced primarily by three conditions: (a) herbicide concentration in the water; (b) length of time the targeted plant species remains exposed to an herbicide

concentration; and (c) the growth stage of the targeted plant at the time of treatment. Understanding the length of time and concentration exposure necessary for a herbicide mode of action to effectively target invasive weeds is critical to planning effective treatments.

June 30th of 2020 concluded the Washington State Department of Ecology water quality grant to explore effective methods to treat Loon Lake hybrid milfoil. The link for the final report https://1drv.ms/w/s!Amu1mIJ1UWuZhhI2CLW_3H0XN3JkzA?e=a9ICgj which will give the history and detail of the three year study undertaken by the Loon Lake LMD, Stevens County, and our aquatic partner Aquatechnex.

Grant Report Conclusions: "The 2019 ProcellaCOR EC herbicide treatment performed July 9th resulted in excellent overall control of hybrid milfoil plants targeted in Loon Lake. At the end of the season in 2019, milfoil plants with live tissue were not present visually within any of the treatment areas of the lake. In confirmation of the visual observations, the

point intercept analysis showed either dead plants or severely injured plants present. At one-year post treatment visual inspection of treatment sites showed little to no milfoil present, in a few locations there were scatter stems extremely low in the water column with injury symptoms present. The point intercept analysis 87 percent of the points showed zero milfoil present and 13 percent has milfoil present in many cases with injury symptoms and at much lower density than pretreatment. There are other areas in Loon Lake that were not subject to herbicide treatment in 2019 that are exhibiting a level of milfoil plants that should be targeted in the early summer of 2020."

2020 has been a different year for the LMD board and Stevens County. Covid19 has made it difficult for our board to meet in person to formulate the planning necessary to accomplish the goals for this season. The alternative has been phone, text, and emails to keep everyone informed. Also, a special thanks to the Loon Lake community for their continued support for our LMD program.

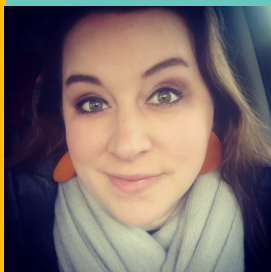

We canceled last year's dock demolition activities, in part due to Covid-19 and partially due to the lack of member contributions and docks, at the prior year's event. The LLPOA is committed to providing the service but cannot continue to cover the costs without contribution by members and lake residents who are taking advantage of the Dock Demo. We are in the process of determining if any other sources of support may exist and we will continue to follow up with local government grants. In the meantime, we will continue to ask members to contribute \$4.00 per linear foot of dock and \$6.00 per foot for non-members.

The main issue is to know how many docks there will be to process, load, and haul away each year. We have noted increased interest in the dock demo this year and we plan on scheduling next year's event in the latter part of June. This is done to avoid tying up the dock for the 4th of July holiday. I would request that dock owners and good Samaritans who find wayward docks continue to contact me at (509) 954-5048 and let me know of your docks, arrange for payments, and get your name and number to call once the date is set and permission is obtained to use the public boat launch area by the WDFW.

In the past there have always

been 15-20 volunteers to help in the removal and loading of the docks into the containers to be hauled away. We will add information to our website, our Facebook page, and on NextDoor, and Instagram to try to get the word out to younger volunteers who might not follow us in the newsletter.

I am encouraging the board to have a co-chair for this committee so that the work load can be shared. A co-chair will assure the process can be documented and passed on to the next year's committee with ease. Please give me a call if you are interested in volunteering or becoming a co-chair.

LOON LAKE BOATING SAFETY AND COURTESY SIGN PROJECT

Late last year, the LLPOA board discussed offering a short introductory boating safety class to anyone interested in the Loon Lake area. This Spring due to COVID-19 and the restrictions on public gatherings, we had to come up with a different way to educate our local boaters.

As there are only a handful of boat launches and marinas on the lake, the next best alternative to in-person training this year was to print custom signs highlighting the key boating safety and courtesy guidelines. The idea of the signs was to not just list the rules and regulations, but it was to make the boaters think about how they would react to different scenarios, in addition to having a QR code to link to the Washington State Boating website.

To make sure that the key concerns were brought up in the sign, I used Nextdoor website and app to ask active neighbors to share their biggest boating concerns. We then were able to come up with 14 guidelines that covered: boat traffic, Wakeboats, fire aircraft, jet skis, life jackets, wildlife, and no-wake zones. Locally, [Colville Signs](#) provided a cost estimate which was then approved by the LLPOA Board. I obtained permission to post signs at all the boat ramps and at the beach associations which had boat slips. To post a sign at the Public Launch, I applied for a Right of Entry from the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife, which took a week. During that time, Colville Signs did a fantastic job printing the aluminum signs and even delivered them.

Once the signs were in-hand, several LLPOA Board members took part in the installation of the signs. I have included some pictures of the signs in their mounting locations. Since the time that the signs were posted, I have received very positive responses from our community.

I look forward to developing further ideas on how to best educate boaters on their responsibilities of making the lake a safe and respectful boating community. If you would like to share your ideas, please email me at stephan.reckie@cgauxnet.us.

WELCOME TO LOON LAKE

PLEASE PRACTICE THESE COURTESY AND SAFETY GUIDELINES WHILE ENJOYING THE LAKE

- Approach and pass oncoming boats on the port (left) side of each other
- Operate all watercraft in a counterclockwise direction within 400 feet of the shore for maximum operator visibility
- Wakeboats are encouraged to use the middle portions of the lake to allow for the waves to dissipate before damaging docks and shoreline
- Move immediately towards shore when fire fighting aircraft are within sight
- Operate jet skis only between sunrise and sunset and wear speed-rated life jackets
- Children under the age of 12 must wear a life jacket in any moving watercraft
- Always carry a WA State Boater Education Card when operating a watercraft of 15 hp or more
- Always keep a safe distance from waterbirds and their nests
- Never operate your watercraft faster than wake speed (5 MPH) within 100 feet of any shoreline, person in the water, stationary boats, or docks
- Never boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs
- Never tow skiers or people without at least a second person as an observer on board
- Did you know that you are ultimately responsible for any damage or harm caused by your wake?
- Did you know that you should lower your orange flag after getting underway while towing skiers, towables, or when people are out of the water?
- Did you know about the dangers of carbon monoxide (CO) in exhaust backdraft when operating a boat at speed or idling?

LOON LAKE FIREWORKS EVENT NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT

The LLPOA has sponsored a Fireworks display for the entire lake for the last 11 years.

By all accounts, this year's fireworks display on Loon Lake was a great success. Many spectators enjoyed the annual patriotic event from their lake home, community beach, or afloat on their boat or barge. For the last few years, the event has been supported by donations by LLPOA members with extra funding coming from the Association's General Fund. As might be expected, with the Covid-19 virus we have seen donations decline this past year. The LLPOA stepped up to fill the gap.

Along with the entertainment and patriotic recognition the event provides, the professional display also serves as an

alternative for many to buying their own fireworks. A professional fireworks display provides the following benefits.

1. Professional fireworks are safer for the community. The fireworks company uses trained personnel and is licensed, bonded and insured.
2. Commercial Fireworks are cleaner and less likely to cause a fire than consumer fireworks. (This is because they burn more completely and leave virtually no residual debris or pollution in the lake.)
3. A community fireworks display offers individuals an option to setting off

their own fireworks around the lake.

The LLPOA would like to request all members and fellow Loon Lake property owners to consider donating to the fireworks fund. The LLPOA will need to decide by April 1, 2021 whether the 2021 Fireworks can be contracted based on donations are received by that date.

LOON LAKE WATER QUALITY UPDATE

The Loon Lake Property Owners Association have for 14 years been measuring and keeping track of the Lake's water quality. The LLPOA data bank on water quality (WQ) is kept by Richard "Dick" Davies. Data has been collected by a group of interested LLPOA members led by Jim Davies. Now that Jim has departed Loon Lake, it will be up to Dick. Jim was introduced to WQ matters and trained by the State Departments of Ecology and the Fisheries. The (WQ) program for Loon Lake was designed by the DOE. Instruments needed for calibration, sampling, and data collection were purchased by a \$10,000 State grant. The instruments are stored at Dick's home. Costs of the program are borne by the LLPOA and at times have been assisted by Sewer District #4 and the Stevens P.U.D. Most costs are caused by Laboratory analyses of collected samples, instrument calibration supplies, and maintenance of equipment used for collection of samples and data. Volunteer crews use Captain Dick's pontoon boat for the forays and make the laboratory deliveries to Spokane, both at no cost to the LLPOA.

The program involves three forays per year. Target dates are June 15, August 1, and September 15. Sometimes wind conditions cause inability to hold anchor and the target dates must slide a day or so. Samples and data are taken at the same anchorage at the deepest part of the Lake. Five one-liter water samples are taken at 3 depths (top, middle, and bottom) and are analyzed for chlorophyll and nutrient (phosphorus and nitrogen compounds). Data including temperature, conductivity, dissolved oxygen, and Ph is taken at meter intervals through the entire water column. The objective is to determine the ongoing

condition of the Lake's WQ.

Loon Lake was created between 15,000 to 20,000 years age during the last (Pleistocene) ice age. As the ice age wound down and the ice began to melt and recede northward, the depression gouged in the granite base by the leading edge of the glacier filled with melt water and glacial till. This formed what was to become the bottom of Loon Lake. Over the succeeding millenniums the bottom layer has grown thicker and richer through the accumulation of sediment from runoff, death of aquatic flora and fauna, dust storms, etc. With the coming of man runoff containing dirt, sewage, fertilizer, lawn debris, trash, beach and forest fire ash, chemicals, etc. accelerated the process.

Since the LLPOA WQ program began in 2007, there has been very little change in the data and sampling program. Prior to 1981 when Sewer District #4 was created the Lake was in rapid decline. It probably continued that rate of decline for a few years thereafter. The sampling and data collection since the beginning of the LLPOA program shows little change. No in-depth statistical analyses have been done but although the data bounces around a bit it has been relatively stable. That is not to say the Lake is now healthy! It is not! In the Summer and early Fall, all of the water below approximately 50 feet in depth is anoxic. Anoxic means that it lacks sufficient dissolved oxygen to support those life forms (other than bacterium) that depend on a level above 4 milligrams per Liter. This includes all the fishes.

Loon Lake cycles through the year. In the Fall the surface water cools. Cold water is more

dense therefore heavier than warm water. The cold water therefore sinks and displaces the warmer, less dense water beneath it. This process continues until the water column's temperature is the same from top to bottom as is the chemical composition (including dissolved Oxygen.). This process is called "Turnover". In the Spring the process is reversed and is called "Stratification". The cold water stays deep and does not mix with that above it. As the surface waters are warmed by the sun, they become lighter and stay at the surface. The oxygen levels fall in the depths mostly through bacterial action, (feasting on the sediments, another word for "rot"). The surface, being exposed to atmosphere and down to about 50 feet becomes oxygenated sufficient to support a fish population. Below 50 feet is "no man's land" and barren.

We have a beautiful Lake but deep beneath the surface lies the mechanism, that unless we continue to monitor and take some effort to control it could, like so many lakes around the world, turn it into a disaster and all the negative things that go with it. All of the things that the LLPOA recommends, including beach fire management; minimal use of fertilizers; careful disposal of yard debris (hooray for "Chipper Days"); no washing of boats and pets in the lake; control of runoff (minimizing impervious surfaces: i.e.: roofs, roads, driveways, minimal use of concrete and asphalt: preservation and care for our precious wetlands (some of which is being done admirably by the Loon Lake Land Conservancy) will keep our lake clean and wonderful and may even make it better for our children and their children for years to come.

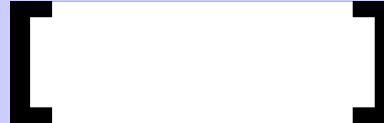
